- Adults with a high school diploma earn 27% more than adults without. Those with a four-year college degee earn 41% more than high school graduates.¹
- Third graders who cannot read on grade level are 4 times less likely to graduate from high school; those living in poverty are 13 times less likely to graduate.²
- Low-income students lose two to three months of reading ability over every summer vacation, resulting in falling 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 years behind by 5th grade.³

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- Nearly 20% of all people living in Greensboro live below the federal poverty threshold¹ of \$11,670 for an individual or \$23,850 for a family of four.²
- To afford a two-bedroom apartment at fair market rent in the Greensboro/High Point area (\$709/month),³ a person earning minimum wage (\$7.25/hour) must work 75 hours a week. 4

- Forty-percent of low-income parents in North Carolina are uninsured, which ranks the state 44th of 50 states.¹
- Access to care isn't the only barrier. One health literacy study in public clinics found that 42% of patients did not comprehend instructions on how to take medication and 49% could not determine if they were eligible for free care by reading financial aid forms.²
